#### Task 3: Presentation

  - → Inequalities
- 3. Choose a particular clip that stood out to you and quote this or add in as a video/audio. Discuss in detail what did you take from it? Did it surprise you?
- 4. What did it teach you about society? Did it change any preconceived ideas or assumptions you held?
- 5. Pose a debate question to your table that has been inspired by the watch/listen. For example, do you think the education system is set up in a way that everyone has an opportunity to thrive? Leave a minute to discuss this.
